Notice to all Hawthorne Residents!

The HNC Board of Director proposes to revise the Hawthorne Neighborhood Phase I and Phase II NRP Plans by reallocating up to \$138,000 of NRP funds between strategies in the plans.

The reallocations will include:

- reducing \$75,000 from Phase I strategy 1.1.3.B Acquisition/Demolition.
- reducing \$25,000 of Phase II Program Income from 1.1.1.A. Rehabilitation Loan Program.
- reducing \$38,000 from Phase II 1.1.7.A. Lowry Corridor Housing Developments.
- adding \$138,000 to Phase II strategy 6.1.1.B Plan Implementation.

The HNC Board will vote on this proposal at the regularly scheduled Board Meeting on May 9th at Farview Park which starts at 6:45 p.m.

You are welcome to attend, participate in the discussion and vote on these issues.

Neighborhoods 2020

The Neighborhoods 2020 process was created by the City Council to look at how the City serves and supports neighborhood organizations both internally and externally via finances, City staffing, organizational/advisory Board oversight, and grant-funded programs.

Each piece is important for equitable and high quality services to be provided to residents. The Neighborhoods 2020 process comprises four important parts:

- consistent funding and programming for neighborhoods and other community-based programs such as the One Minneapolis Fund and the Community Innovation Fund;
- proper sizing and oversight of these programs by an advisory body;
- a consistent citywide community engagement policy for the City of Minneapolis that incorporates the Core Principles of Community Engagement;
- evaluating the Neighborhood and Community Relations Department’s service delivery model and making changes if necessary.

Neighborhood leaders and volunteers across Minneapolis said they were uneasy and had a lot of questions about a new initiative that could change the structure and funding of their associations. They wanted to know why these changes were proposed and to make sure the City was listening to their feedback.

For the third year in a row, Hawthorne Neighborhood Council will be a vendor at the Northside Housing Fair. Stop by the HNC booth to pick up information on our housing assistance programs. 2019 HNC Spring Clean UP

Hawthorne Neighborhood Council is hosting a Neighborhood Spring Clean event on Saturday, April 27th! HNC will provide you with equipment to go out into the neighborhood to pick up trash and make our neighborhood shine! At the end of the clean up, HNC will host a party at our office to celebrate all the volunteers who picked up trash. There will be food, music, games and prizes! Upper Harbor Park Update:

The Upper Harbor Terminal development is moving closer to reality. Finalized plans will soon go before the City Council for a vote. The initial draft version of the concept plan was presented for community input at a series of meetings from August to November of 2018. In response to the input received, the draft concept plan was revised and presented to the community at two meetings on December 8 and 11. The current concept plan includes new apartments, a public park, retail spaces, a hotel and an outdoor music venue. The cost estimate for the first phase of the project for private development is \$200 million. To make sure the project maintains the communities' trust, the Economic Development and Regulatory Services Committee passed a resolution that established an advisory group for the riverfront redevelopment. On January 21, 2019, in St. Paul, MN held the 33rd annual Martin Luther King Jr. celebration. The state honored the women of color in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). One of the women honored was chemist and philanthropist Dr. Reatha Clark King. Governor Tim Walz presented Dr. King with the Civil Rights Legend Award. This is one of many awards that she has received.

The former president of Metropolitan State University, is a chemist by trade who practiced her craft working for General Mills, where she later became vice president of the General Mills Foundation

Dr. Clark King is a role model for a lot of women of color. She has shown that it doesn't matter where you come from, because as long as you put your mind to it, you can accomplish anything you set out to do in life.

YCB Outreach Teams

The Minneapolis Youth Coordinating Board has 3 outreach teams throughout the city, helping youth to stay out of trouble and broaden their outlook on life.



First, you have the Downtown Outreach Team, whose mission is to connect disruptive and disengaged youths with meaningful activities and resources that are downtown. This Outreach team is 1 of 6 to win a Chief Merit Award in 2018.

Next, you have the School Outreach Team, which entered MPS in 2013, building upon the success of the Downtown Outreach Team. For the past 4 years, they have worked with South, Roosevelt, Wellstone, and Henry High School, with whom they have partnered with for the 2018-2019 school year.

This year, the Northside Community Outreach team has expanded to reach out to North Minneapolis, with the help of Minneapolis Health Department, which acquired a grant from the CDC to help with youth violence prevention.

These outreach team members are now not only around to help the schools, they are now able to outreach to parks, community spaces, businesses, transit locations and neighborhood events.

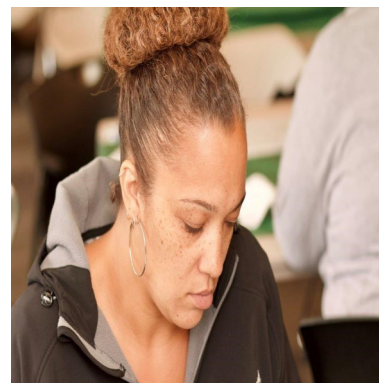
The Northside Urban Coalition project will address:

Spring Time tips: by Bill Magnuson

Minneapolis and Spring traditionally mean Spring cleanup time. At this time of the year, you should remember that keeping your block and neighborhood clean can go a long way to keeping your neighborhood safe. The following "tips" should help you, the Police Department and other City agencies build a cleaner and safer community this season and throughout the year.

Make sure you don't "pile up" problems.

Spring cleaning inside your home can lead to problems outside. Boxes and other materials can be invitations for arson. Make sure they don't pile up by coordinating your spring cleaning with bulk pickup days in your Neighborhood. If you are unsure of the dates, call your Neighborhood Association, or 311. If you must place refuse in the alley, be sure that the pile is not near wooden structures or fences that can be easily ignited.

Make sure your lights are working.

Light is one of the greatest crime preventers. Check your garage, porch and backyard lights to ensure that they are in working order. Scan your street and alley lights and report outages to 311. Don't forget about the lights at parks and playlots. Unlit parks can be gathering or hiding places for those who would commit illegal activities.

Make sure abandoned and neglected buildings are reported.

Left alone, they pose a threat of fire and criminal assault. City ordinances can be effective tools for the city to make sure that such buildings are cleaned out, fixed up or removed. Bring problem buildings to the attention of your Crime Prevention Specialist or to your next block club, or crime and safety meeting to ensure the attention and action needed.

Hawthorne Community Standards

Please help us in taking a very aggressive stand against the following behaviors in Hawthorne and in supporting strong implementation of each positive standard.

Excess noise in our neighborhood—This includes loud car stereos, horn honking and loud parties. We believe that everyone in our neighborhood has the right to peace and quiet and these activities adversely affect the livability of our neighborhood.

Litter and garbage around homes and in the streets—This neighborhood is YOUR neighborhood.

Please, pickup after yourselves. We all have a right to a well-kept neighborhood. Each of us needs to do our part to make Hawthorne a place where we can be proud to live.



Disrespect for people and property—This includes harassing people, yelling obscenities, stealing, vandalizing, writing graffiti and picking fights. We believe all people should be treated with respect and getting along with people is one of the most important actions we can take to build a stronger community. If situations persist, contact 311 to report hate crimes.



Violence, drugs and crime— Specifically dealing and using drugs, prostitution, assault, and carrying or using a weapon. We believe in a violence-free community. We all have a responsibility to be law-abiding citizens and to set an example for one another.
